The city's design heritage – a mini-Washington DC for a state

within a nation

Government is the founding industry

Reflected in the term "polis"

Circles have a special place in that design

The formal name of the Circle is also revealing

Governor's Circle

"Church Circle" is the informal nickname - 5 in all

Of a park, the pigs, and an abandoned home

This is one River current of the Club's Pre-History

Friday, April 12, 1861

First Presbyterian Church, next door

Benjamin Harrison is a young elder

Working in a basement office

A man descends the stairs...

"They've fired on Fort Sumter"

Harrison sits and stares, alone, in the candlelight

<u>What do you suggest he do in his relationship with his father?</u>



Saturday, August 31, 1861

The Democratic Party of Indiana holds its convention

Nominate candidates and write platforms

Toward the end of the meeting a group of people emerge...

...with threats of violence and intimidation

Demand Democratic Party members take an oath of allegiance – tense agreement, Militia Act's oath

Marion County Sheriff William Wallace leads 100 men into

Governor's Circle to maintain civic order

Is a loyalty oath a part of war?

Wednesday, July 23, 1862

Benjamin Harrison has been a Lt. Colonel for two weeks

He is organizing a 1,000-man unit, the 70th Indiana Regiment, comprised of 10 100-man companies

The Circle is the scene for a 8pm rally

The sole purpose is to continue the process of filling the 70th Indiana, set to depart sometime in the next several weeks

Special speakers will be featured

This is the Circle's Indiana Regiment

<u> "Remember !"</u>



Wednesday, May 20, 1863

75,000 people in the city at the State Capitol

The Democratic Party convention

US and Militia troops stationed throughout downtown

Infantry and artillery located at Governor's Circle

Dispute over whether cannon were aimed west on Market St.

Clement Vallandigham

The military draft



1864

Captain James Bracken of Hancock County meets with former members of his cavalry unit on Governors Circle in his campaign to become a Democratic State Senator

Republican anti-Sons of Liberty (abolition?) hold a disappointing meeting in Governor's Circle – few participate

General Alvin Hovey is keynote speaker at a rally – Reserve Military Band - strong support for Lincoln and urges harsh treatment toward Southern sympathizers

Lambdin Milligan et al on trial

What is the reality of "home front" in time of war?

- The Club's Founders shared a common event and experience 24 years before Club Founding
- This event and experience was not the same for all Founders
- This event and experience is the defining adult moment of the Club's Founding spirit, Benjamin Harrison
