37 years old, sharply-cut face, those eyes

He's been serving in the US Senate for less than a year


Several Club members had opposed his candidacy

His Toast: To The American Century

America is in the Western Hemisphere, is now in Asia, and will soon be in Africa


Benjamin Harrison stands up to deliver Toast #9...

66 years old, stout, graying, a veteran

Former POTUS for six years – active in state and local affairs as well as international arbitration

The founding spirit of the Club

He has a single burning experience that has defined his life



We are indeed the newest Great Power

Be wary of the supposed benefits of imperialism and war

America can lead if America offers respect, mutual gain, and true partnership

This is the way to illustrate leadership to the world

The Club is organized not to control or take spoils but to share principles and goodwill

Why is this story so important?

It has national and global implications

Harrison's toast represents an "Alternative American Future"

It fundamentally changes the American reality of World War I (1914-1918), which affects post-war

It offers a model to consider for the next phase of American involvement now
